We explored the ground work techniques promoted by natural horsemanship programs, then refined these in the saddle through the Roach Approach. There were several expressions of surprise and appreciation as we observed distinct changes in our horses' response, our personal riding skills, and the understanding of a higher level of communication in a closer relationship with our horses.

The instructors added to this revelation with skill techniques within a Versatility program in the Maple Crest Horse playground – a riding track, jumping (on purpose) logs, gate, mailbox, platforms, humps – even a teeter totter for the horse. Following instruction, with safety primary, the challenges were approached. Add some frustrations and lots of laughter our horses tried to explain there was no real purpose for this type of play.



Then to put icing on the cake Linda, Larry, and Charlie presented a course in Cowboy Dressage. A refined manner of riding where each movement of the horse is a smooth coordinated effort using a controlled riding technique of positioning following a programmed sequence.
